Types of authority / rank

Authorities have the capacity and capability to rule by their spirit, soul or body.








Authorities also choose the level of empowerment and decision making cascaded through ranks.


At home:

At work:

You raise this with your wife who disregards it and states; "Everyone knows uncle can be creepy sometimes"

At home

You love your father but of late he has become insular and doesn't talk much with you or your mother.





One evening you arrive home to hear from your mother that they have argued your father has thrown your mother to the floor. You get angry, but your mother says;

"This is the first time it has happened and it will never happen again. Your father is under a lot of stress from work and it will resolve itself in the wash"
